As Club President Chris ensured a constantly growing chartered club casually channelling charity goodness out into the universe. Through multiple events, DOGOODERY initiatives and pub quizzes the club became a local institution that today is heavily involved in many local community committees. The second and inarguably most successful thing he got done was coin the term DOGOODERY.

From this Chris became District 1070 DRR and has expanded the successful model across the entire district with more and more clubs growing each year. As expected, his favourite part is sharing the Rotaract message on a stage; his least favourite is writing bios.

Peter Wells District 1100 Foundation Chair

District 1100 Foundation Chair, 2014-20, and End Polio Now Champion, 2011-20, recipient of the Rotary International Service Award (Europe) 2017 for service towards the goal of polio eradication.

Peter's beginnings were in the poorer part of south London where he contracted polio before the advent of vaccines began to blunt the spread of polio in the UK.

During his career as a teacher he has worked closely with organisations addressing the needs of young physically disabled people and the promotion of opportunities for people of all abilities to access education as they progress along the path of their infinite potential. A

former Trustee of Teenage Cancer Trust he is today Vice Chair of a large FE college providing vocational education to graduate level serving students of every social background, culture and ability.

Invited to join Rotary in 2002 he has been active in and as chair of various club committees and is Past President of Swindon Rotary Club (2010/11). A multiple Paul Harris Fellow he has since 2011 undertaken the role of End Polio Now Champion in D1100, speaking to clubs and conferences within and beyond district about his own experience of polio and the efforts of Rotary, locally, nationally and internationally.



Keith Moger Rotary Doctor Bank

A founder member of Cardiff Bay Rotary, Keith, a multiple Paul Harris Fellow, has served in many of the club offices, held several district portfolios and was Coordinator of Rotary Doctor Bank Great Britain & Ireland for ten years, still actively supporting the charity. A Health Services manager by training and experience, he held a number of senior posts at hospital and regional levels before retiring in 2000, when he was awarded an MBE for his contribution to

the National Health Service in Wales. As well as Doctor Bank, Keith's main Rotary interest is in developing membership and in helping to organise car parking which has brought over half a million pounds worth of charitable income to his club. Keith lives in Cardiff, he has two children and four grandchildren and is also heavily involved in his local community, not least singing in a choir - Wales is the land of song after all!



Anna Dixie

Anna joined ShelterBox in July 2017 after a 10 year career in refugee rights. As a legal adviser at organisations such as British Refugee Council and the Asylum Support Appeals Project, Anna defended the rights of displaced people to

shelter and support. She continues to pursue this goal as an Operations Coordinator at ShelterBox, working in successful partnership with Rotary clubs around the world, from the Philippines to the Dominican Republic.



Bol Maywal
Peace, Conflict, and Development

In 2013, Bol earned his Bachelor's degree from North Carolina's Belmont Abbey College in Political Science and a minor in military science. Previously. Bol worked for a number of years as a Case Coordinator for refugee resettlement through Catholic Charities. He helped refugees become self-sufficient and self-reliant upon arriving in the United States. In 2015, as an officer in the US Army, he volunteered for a NATO Peace Operation Mission in Kosovo and work with disadvantaged families, school children. teachers, and community to build partnerships and friendship between the locals and NATO. Upon completion of his deployment, he was awarded a Non-Article 5 NATO Peace Medal

in the service of peace and freedom. This was his first opportunity to make a difference in the world.

He understands the importance of peace because of his first hand experience during the Sudanese Civil War and his recent role as an international peacekeeper.

He began his Master's degree in Peace, Conflict, and Development at the University of Bradford in September 2018. He is convinced that his life calling is to use his education to serve others and contribute as a proactive agent of peace globally.

Bol enjoys playing basketball, reading, and spending time with family and friends.



### Alcester Junior Drama Club

Alcester Junior Drama club was founded over 50 years ago as a community drama group, and thanks to generations of volunteers we continue to thrive. All young people between the ages of 8 and 16 are welcome and we take pride in our policy that every child who attends, has a place performing in our shows. We write our own scripts using traditional tales with a twist or new stories devised from the ideas of the group. We have a full length show every February and are regularly invited to perform at local events such as Alcester Olympic celebrations, Council events, Garden Parties and Christmas Fayres. Members are coached by our creative team of former members, all of whom have gone on to specialise in Drama, Music and/or Teaching, resulting in fun lively shows for both players and audiences. For parents, this might be their first encounter with Shakespeare, or the first time they have seen their child take the lead and step into the spotlight.

We hope you enjoy the performance from one of those schools taking part in this year's Festival today and that together we look forward to transforming another 300,000 young lives through the unique power of Shakespeare.

School: Nicholas Chamberlaine School is a coeducational secondary school with academy status, located in the town of Bedworth, Warwickshire. With approximately 1,700 boys and girls between the ages of 11 and 18, it is one of the largest schools in Warwickshire.

Twelfth Night, or What You Will is a comedy by William Shakespeare, believed to have been written around 1601–1602 as a Twelfth Night's entertainment for the close of the Christmas season. The play centres on the twins Viola and Sebastian, who are separated in a shipwreck. Viola (who is disguised as Cesario) falls in love with Duke Orsino, who in turn is in love with the Countess Olivia. Upon meeting Viola, Countess Olivia falls in love with her thinking she is a

The play expanded on the musical interludes and riotous disorder expected of the occasion, with plot elements drawn from the short story "Of Apollonius and Silla" by Barnabe Rich, based on a story by Matteo Bandello. The first recorded performance was on 2 February 1602, at Candlemas, the formal end of Christmastide in the year's calendar. The play was not published until its inclusion in the 1623 First Folio.
