In the light of your experience what advice would you give to anyone thinking about setting up a camp?	This is an easy formula to follow. The Rotarians in the district know how and why RYLA works and they see the benefits of an international RYLA. At the end of the RYLA week the overseas students stay on and spend a day in Brighton, where we use the UK students to show them around and a day in London. We normally have 5 groups of 10 students doing various

	activities. Each group contains 2 overseas students.

Number of students/ Gender balance/ Age range	Eighteen students. We aim to have equal split male/female. Generally ages between 16/19
Selection - how?	We offer places to RI contacts in various countries. We try to change the choice of countries each year. They then submit STEP forms with their preferred choices.

However we still have to seek approval each year from District Council to finance and hold the Camp. Home hosts need to be agreed as early as possible as Enhanced DBS checks are necessary Ensure that hosts are fully aware of their obligations before they agree to the role Go for it!
