Balloon Races and the Environment – Guidance for Clubs A Well-Deserved Queens Award for Voluntary Service Rodney Huggins Environmental Awards The Rotary Tree Challenge

Some Rotary Clubs have been using Balloon Races as a means to generate funds.

However, there is some concern about the impact these are having on the environment and complaints have been received about such events

Clubs are encouraged to behave responsibly and if possible use methods other than a physical balloon release in future.

What is the problem – aren't balloons biodegradable?

It is true that latex balloons are biodegradable but the more modern ones having metal/mylar are not.

There appears to be one objective study of the topic. On exposure to sunlight degradation begins and after release a properly inflated balloon will reach 5000m or

more by which time the air temperature will have fallen to less than -20°C and the latex will become brittle and fragment into numerous very small pieces which quickly degrade further. These should decay in a short time and cause little harm to the environment.

However around 10% of the balloons may be faulty or are underinflated and come down in larger pieces which will take longer to degrade and can thus harm animals. These larger remnants degrade as quickly as an oak tree leaf.

Other problems arise from any string, streamers or tags attached to balloons as these are usually much less biodegradable than latex.

However biodegradability is only part of the problem.
Balloons are filled with helium and herein is one concern of many as this gas has a limited resource and mankind should concentrate on using it in closed situations such as Nuclear Magnetic Resonance

Imaging (MRI) scanners used increasingly for medical diagnostics. A recent study by the Universities of Oxford and Durham does suggest that there may be more helium than first thought, but generally the consensus is that stocks are limited.

Alternatives to physical balloon releases

- Instead of a physical balloon release why not have the drama of a number of balloons inflated and get sponsorship for each but instead of release allow them to slowly deflate **WITHOUT** release and the winner is the one which is last to deflate.
- Organise a Virtual Balloon Race - The e-Club of East Anglia have already successfully had two such races and are planning a third.
